Solutions to the exercises:

- 1) 1...Nb6! traps the white queen
- 2) 1...Rxf1+! 2.Kxf1 Qb5+ wins the unprotected rook on a4. The reversed move-order 1...Qb5? Fails to the in-between move 2.Ra8+
- 3) 1...Rxg3+! 2.Kxg3 Rxf2 3.Kxf2 a2 simplifies the game and wins. Don't fall for 1...Rxf2?? Stalemate
- 4) 1...Re1+ 2.Rxe1 Qxe1+ 3.Kg2 Bh3+! followed by 4...Qxe8 picks up the unprotected queen on e8.
